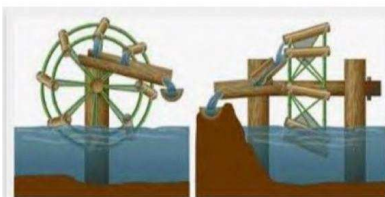

Sample Static Direct Hit

Whether the Persian wheel was in use in early medieval Rajasthan is debated, and hinges on the interpretation of the term **araghatta**. The key issue is whether the reference is to the Persian wheel or to the **noria**. The **noria** is a wheel which has pots or buckets attached to its rim without a chain for carrying the pots, or a gear mechanism to ensure continuous flow of water. It could only be used to draw water from close to the surface or from a river.



→ Explained in details in BTS class (LEVEL-2)

The Persian wheel, on the other hand, had gears and a chain to carry the pots and was associated with a well. **araghatta** seems to have been different from an ordinary well (**dhimada**) or a step well (**vapi**), **UPSC PYQ**.

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TOPIC-2-Attitude: Content, Structure, Function; its Influence and Relation with Thought and Behaviour; Moral and Political Attitudes; Social Influence and Persuasion.

SECTION 1: Attitude – The Architecture of Thinking and Acting
"Your attitude, not your aptitude, determines your attitude."

Attitudes are not fleeting emotions—they are **deep-set mental positions** that govern our perceptions, evaluations, and actions. In public life, where decisions impact thousands, and biases can cause injustice, understanding *what attitudes are, how they are formed, and how they influence behaviour* becomes crucial. Attitudes are the *silent drivers* behind daily decision-making, ethical judgment, and leadership behaviour. They form the *invisible software* that processes every external event into a personal or public reaction.

1.1 What is Attitude?

Attitude is a psychological tendency expressed by evaluating an object, person, issue, or event with some degree of favor or disfavor.

In simpler terms, **attitude is a learned predisposition** that influences how an individual thinks, feels, and behaves toward a specific entity.

Real-World Example:

- A civil servant who respects participatory democracy will proactively involve Gram Sabhas in rural development projects.
- Conversely, a bureaucrat with an elitist attitude may avoid community interactions, believing people are incapable of intelligent contributions.

1.2 Content of Attitude – The ABC Components

Attitudes are multi-dimensional constructs comprising:

Affective Component (Emotion or Feeling)

- Reflects how an individual **feels** toward the object.
- Example:** Feeling pride when seeing the national flag.

Behavioural Component (Action Tendency)

- Reflects how an individual **behaves** or intends to behave.
- Example:** Actively participating in elections because one values democracy.

Cognitive Component (Beliefs and Knowledge)

- Reflects what an individual **believes** about the object.
- Example:** Believing that voting is essential for a vibrant democracy.

Chalukyas of Badami & Pallavas - Key Facts

- **Chalukyas of Badami:** Pulakesi II is famous for defeating Harsha at the **Battle of Narmada (634 CE)**. His court was visited by **Hiuen Tsang**. Pulakesi was later killed by the Pallava king **Narasimhavarman I** in 642 CE.
- **Pallavas of Kanchipuram:** Known for building the **Shore Temple**, the monolithic **Pancha Rathas** at Mahabalipuram, and the **Kailasanatha Temple**. **Narasimhavarman I** held the title **Mamalla**.
- **Later Cholas:** Founded by **Vijayalaya (850 CE)**. **Rajaraja I** built the massive **Brihadeeswarar Temple (1010 CE)**. **Rajendra I** launched a famous naval expedition against **Srivijaya**.

Important NCERT Concepts

- **Matsya Nyaya:** Translates to the **law of the fish** (the strong devour the weak). Describes the period of extreme anarchy in Bengal prior to **Gopala's** election.
- **Khalimpur Copper Plate:** The definitive primary source proving that **Gopala** was democratically elected by nobles.
- **Vikramashila University:** Located in Bihar. Its most famous scholar was **Atisha Dipankara**, who later traveled to Tibet to reform Buddhism. The university was destroyed by **Bakhtiyar Khilji** in 1203 CE.
- **Nalanda University:** Originally founded by the **Guptas (Kumaragupta I)**. NOT the Palas. The Palas only acted as patrons and renovators.
- **Pancha Rathas:** Built by **Narasimhavarman I**. Entirely rock-cut from single stones. Despite the name, they have absolutely **no historical connection to the Mahabharata Pandavas**.
- **Hiranyagarbha:** A ritual of the "golden womb" used by non-Kshatriya rulers to claim royal lineage through **Sanskritization**.
- **Srivijaya Kingdom:** A major maritime empire in modern **Indonesia** that controlled Southeast Asian trade and Buddhist learning networks.

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THEME 1 - EARLY MEDIEVAL INDIA (750-1200 CE) - Palas, Pratihars, Rashtrakutas & Chalukyas

The period from 750 to 1200 CE is defined by the **Tripartite Struggle**, a continuous three-way war over the city of **Kanauj** (the former capital of Harsha). This endless conflict exhausted the Palas, Pratihars, and Rashtrakuts, leaving North India completely vulnerable to the later invasions of **Mahmud of Ghazni**.

UPSC TRAP ALERT
Kailash Temple of Ellora was built by the Rashtrakutas (Krishna I), NOT the Chalukyas. Kaviyasaagara is the oldest Kannada work. NOT Sanskrit.

Palas Dynasty -

- **Gopala (c. 750 CE):** Founder. Uniquely elected by a council of nobles to end regional anarchy. This is documented in the **Khalimpur Copper Plate** inscription.
- **Dharmapala (770-810 CE):** The greatest Pala ruler. He founded the massive **Vikramashila University** (108 monasteries) and patronised **Nalanda**. He was responsible for sending Buddhist missionaries to Southeast

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- **UPSC 2016:** The sophisticated administrative and revenue assignment mechanism, directly analogous to the **Delhi Sultanate's Iqta system**, was the **Amara-Nayaka system**.
- **UPSCS 2020:** The magnificent **Kalyana Mandapa** (marriage pavilion), heavily adorned with exquisitely carved pillars, became a mandatory and distinctive architectural feature in temple construction during the **Vijayanagara Empire**.
- **UPSC 2015:** The Persian ambassador **Abdur Razaq** visited the Vijayanagara court during the reign of the Sangama ruler **Devaraya II**.
- **MPPSC 2019 & RPSC 2017:** The monumental literary masterpiece on statecraft, the **Amuktamalyada**, was authored by the emperor **Krishnadevaraya** in the **Telugu** language.
- **UPSC 2019:** The great scholar-king **Krishnadevaraya** belonged strictly to the **Tuluva Dynasty**, which was the third ruling house of the empire.
- **BPSC 2021:** The decisive and catastrophic **Battle of Talikota (Rakshasi-Tangadi)**, which led to the total destruction of **Hampti**, was fought in the year **1565 CE**.
- **UPSC 2020:** The Portuguese traveler who explicitly documented the active presence of women as accountants, astrologers, and guards in the Vijayanagara court was **Fernao Nuniz**.
- **UPSC 2017:** The elite group of eight supreme Telugu poets, known as the **Ashtadiggajas**, ornamented the royal court of **Krishnadevaraya**.
- **CDS 2018:** The Portuguese merchant and chronicler **Domingo Paes** famously compared the sheer geographical scale and immense wealth of **Hampti** to the city of **Rome**.

UPSC Prelims Traps to Avoid

- **The Navaratnas vs Ashtadiggajas Trap:** A highly common error is confusing these royal courts. **Krishnadevaraya** had the **Ashtadiggajas** (Eight Elephants of Telugu Literature). The **Navaratnas** (Nine Gems) belong exclusively to the ancient court of **Chandragupta II (Vikramaditya)** and the medieval court of the Mughal Emperor **Akbar**.
- **Talikota as the Immediate End:** Examiners often claim that the Vijayanagara Empire completely collapsed and ceased to exist immediately after 1565. This is factually incorrect. While the capital **Hampti** was destroyed, the empire fundamentally survived for another 80 years under the **Araavidu Dynasty**, ruling from **Pemukonda** and **Chandragiri** until **1646 CE**.
- **Nature of the Amara-Nayaka Grants:** Do not assume these grants were permanently hereditary from the beginning. Just like the **Delhi Sultans** with the **Iqta system**, the **Vijayanagara Rayas** constantly **transferred and rotated** the **Amara-nayakas** from one territory to another to prevent them from establishing independent, rebellious dynasties. They only became hereditary during the empire's later decline.
- **Language of Amuktamalyada:** Because **Krishnadevaraya** patronized Sanskrit heavily and wrote the **Jambavati Kalyanam** in it, options often list **Amuktamalyada** as a Sanskrit text. It is unequivocally one of the greatest works in the **Telugu** language.
- **The Status of Berar:** When identifying the **Deccan Sultanates** that formed the **Grand Alliance** at **Talikota**, strictly exclude **Berar**. **Berar** did not participate in the coalition against **Vijayanagara** due to intense, pre-existing territorial hostilities with its neighbor, **Ahmadnagar**.
- **Ibn Battuta's Timeline:** A severe chronological trap places **Ibn Battuta** in the court of **Krishnadevaraya**. **Ibn Battuta** visited India in the **14th century (1333 CE)** during the reign of **Harithara I**, nearly 175 years before **Krishnadevaraya** ascended the throne.
- **Origins of the Vijayanagara Founders:** Statements claiming **Harihara** and **Bukka** were originally independent Hindu kings are false. They were subordinate **feudatories and ministers**, first under the **Kakatiys**, then under the **Kampili** state, and briefly operated as **Muslim administrators** for **Muhammad**

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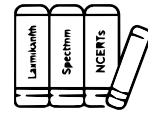

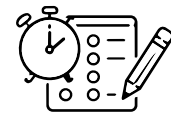
